### Adams County Broadband Update

The Adams County Community Broadband Task Force (BBTF) has been busy over the past few months making presentations to and receiving feedback from key stakeholders. Over the past few weeks, the BBTF has been reaching out to potential partners on a grant application. The county recently put out a public notice soliciting potential partners to attend the next BBTF meeting on February 8<sup>th</sup> at 1:30PM. This meeting is open to the public and will be held at the Economic Alliance offices located at 1300 Proline Place, Gettysburg. The BBTF meeting will be focused on receiving input from community partners of their interest to apply for the Covid-19 ARPA Capital Projects Fund Multi-Purpose Community Facilities Program grant. The purpose of this grant is "to carry out critical capital projects directly enabling work, education, and health monitoring". ## Coroner

### National Coroner Week

With the recent change in Office of Adams County Coroner from Coroner Pat Felix to Francis Dutrow (who was Pat's long-time Deputy), it seemed appropriate to mention and recognize National Coroner Week.

Adams County is charged with providing many critical services that do not have a high profile and are often taken for granted. The Office of Coroner would make that list. January 21-27 was National Coroner's Week. The coroner's primary responsibility is to make inquiry into the cause of death and complete the certificate of death. An interesting and historical act is that the office of coroner (or crowner) dates back to medieval times in England when the "crowner" was responsible for looking into deaths, to be sure the death taxes were paid to the king.

The job of Coroner responsibility breaks down generally into pronouncing death and what time death occurred, scene investigation, custody of the body, making positive identification, notification to next of kin, discovery of remains, issuing death certificates and completing all required reports. It obviously takes a special set of skills and character to perform this task effectively with professionalism and compassion. A huge thank you to both Pat & Dutty for their past service, and best wishes and appreciation to Dutty for continuing that legacy of service!

### **Adams County Council of Government 2024 Leadership**

The role of ACCOG is to provide a forum by which Adams County governmental entities may meet to discuss issues of mutual interest, and to coordinate joint activities between members. The group meets once a month at the Adams County Department of Emergency Service bringing together boroughs, townships, the County, school districts and elected officials. There is normally a featured speaker on a current topic of interest with updates and reports from many entities. ### **Courthouse Glass Re-cycling Now Available**

The new Adams County Glass Recycling Initiative has been well publicized. Through the collaboration of Adams County, and several community volunteer groups and individuals, clean glass can be dropped off to volunteers at the county complex beside the 911 Center (230 Greenamyer Lane) on designated Saturday's. During the winter it will be the 1<sup>st</sup> Saturday of the month from 9AM-12PM. Drop-off opportunities are expected to be expanded in the Spring.

As part of this glass re-cycling initiative, the County has placed a green container, clearly marked "Glass Recycling Only" in the County buildings. Thank you in advance for doing our part to recycle during our work hours.

### **Prevailing Wage Threshold Impacts Projects + Taxpayers**

Publicly funded construction projects in Pennsylvania costing more than \$25,000 are subject to prevailing wage requirements. The threshold, not adjusted for inflation or industry changes in more

than 60 years, would amount to more than \$250,000 in 2023. Without

an increase to the threshold, counties, and other munic-

ipalities, are spending significantly more mon-

ey on projects that could

other-

wise be utilized in other areas of their overall budgets. Prevailing wage requirements can increase the cost of many projects, generally by 10 to 15% depending on the region in which the project is being done. Projects hitting the threshold include lawn maintenance contracts, broadband projects, and the construction of prisons, juvenile detention facilities, and local courthouses, among many others.

In 2013 the state did amend prevailing wage from the threshold of \$25,000 to

\$100,000 for only highway and bridge projects. 18 states now have no prevailing wage law with 10 of those having repealed prevailing wage. From the counties perspective Prevailing Wage Reform is needed by eliminating the prevailing wage mandate for state, local government, and school districts to free up taxpayer dollars for other priorities, allow school districts and local government to opt out of wage mandates, or raise the threshold at which prevailing wage is applied. Hopefully, the legislature will act on some point on these reforms.
