Honoring Flag Day June 14th

To many across the nation this past Wednesday, Flag Day, was a minor named holiday with underappreciated meaning and significance. This motivated me to feature Flag Day as a TGIF item. Flag Day commemorates the day the first flag resolution was passed June 14, 1777. This was 1-year after Betsy Ross received the order from General George Washington to make the first flag. It was resolved that the flag would have 13 stripes, alternating red and white; that the union would be 13 stars, white in a navy-blue field, representing a new Constellation.

The first national observance of Flag Day was June 14, 1877, 100 years after the flag resolution was adopted. In 1916 President Wilson issued a proclamation stating
that June 14 shall be National
Flag Day. It subsequently was made official
by an Act of Congress. Flag Day is a reminder that every American should pause at least for a moment on that day and reflect on what the
United States of America means to them, and celebrate the history, sacrifice and freedom the
American Flag symbolically represents.
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The Adams County Allied Veteran's, in conjunction with Biglerville American Legion Post 262, organize an evening flag retirement ceremony and program at Legion Woods in Biglerville each year on Flag Day. The event which was held on Wednesday, is normally well attended and has a wonderful patriotic and community vibe. The program is followed by a picnic supper. Put Flag Day in Legion Woods on your list of events to attend in the future.

Sachs Mill Covered Bridge To Get Face Lift

The historic Sachs Mill Covered Bridge is a cherished iconic landmark in Adams County. It is certainly one of my go to favorite views in Adams County. In the Fall when the leaves are bursting with color, stop on the Pumping Station Road bridge and look south down Marsh Creek. It's a picture postcard! When Marsh Creek is frozen and snow covered in winter it is stunning! Thank goodness a previous board of commissioner chose to preserve it when it washed downstream in the 70's during hurricane Agnes.

At the June 7th commissioners public meeting the board signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with The Theodore Burr Covered Bridge Society of Pennsylvania, Inc., a nonprofit organization dedicated to the preservation and restoration of covered bridges in Pennsylvania. This MOU provides for the painting of the historic Sachs Covered Bridge by the Society - at no additional cost to the County. The Society will paint the outside of the bridge and apply flame retardant to the inside of the bridge. Work is anticipated to begin the first week of August

2023. The MOU is effective June 7, 2023.



Community Development Block Grant Applications Open

At Wednesday's Commissioners Public meeting an initial public hearing was held to announce the next round of Community Block Grants. Any government agency or non-profit with a qualifying project can apply to the Adams County Office of Planning & Development. Applications must be submitted by July 28, 2023. Broadly speaking, Community Block Grants can be utilized for community development and social services. Block grants are fixed pots of money that the federal government gives to states to provide benefits and services. 911 Funding Bill Passes House

Funding emergency and 911 service is an essential and critical service, but costly to provide. County's get some reimbursement but the difference comes out of the General Fund – thus the taxpayer's pocket. The Pennsylvania House on Wednesday passed 121-82 a bill that will increase the existing \$1.65 monthly fee to \$1.97 on Pennsylvania telephone bills. The funds will support equipment, operations and upgrade outdated technology. The new fee is expected to generate an additional \$30 million per year. Both the Adams County Board of Commissioners and the County Commissioners Association of Pennsylvania supported the increase, but have called for a higher amount in the range of \$2.20. According to Adams County Department of Emergency Services Director Warren Bladen and Budget Office of Budget, the cost of County funded emergency services is approximately \$700 per Adams County household per year. The total 911 budget is \$3.7M with revenues of only \$2.1M. The overall Department of Emergency Services budget is approximately \$4.5M with revenues of \$2.2M. Unfortunately, neither the current rate, or the newly enacted rate, off-set the cost of service of the deficit for 911!
