IT Update

The Information Technology Department is pleased to announce that the current County website will be upgraded in 2020. The project will be completed in partnership with the County Commissioners Association of Pennsylvania (CCAP) who is currently the County's web hosting partner. As part of the project, the current 2010 Microsoft SharePoint platform will be moved to a proprietary software platform through Kentico. This web content management platform will provide the core software components and features necessary for the website to function. New tools will also be introduced, including digital web forms that can be submitted directly from the website. Throughout this transition, the IT department will notify departments on the progress of the migration. The project is expected to take most of 2020 to complete.

In addition, the IT department assisted the Public Defender's office in transitioning to a new records management system. The new records management system is part of an offering through CCAP called "Unified Case Management."

The new system will remove manual entry for managing cases by interfacing automatically with the AOPC databases. This trend is becoming the norm, as many localized County systems now have the ability to directly interface with the primary systems hosted by the state. This modernization effort should be considered by all departments who are currently doing manual entry and are encouraged to see what options are available.

Furthermore, the department has also been working through various department moves throughout the Courthouse. The Solicitor, Controller, Finance, Public Defender, and Prothonotary's office have requested IT services in some capacity to either move the entire office or begin work towards modernizing the existing office space. The IT department will work towards balancing department move requests, work orders, department requested projects, and IT specific projects throughout the rest of 2019 and into 2020. The IT governance committee will continue to be the primary group prioritizing which projects the IT department will be focused on. An up-to-date list of active department requested IT projects can be found on the county intranet on the IT page under Project Management.
